

PANELIST BIOGRAPHIES

KISHORE MAHBUBANI (*featured presenter*) is the author of two previous books: Can Asians Think? and Beyond the Age of Innocence: Rebuilding Trust between America and the World. Currently, the Dean and Professor in the Practice of Public Policy of the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy at the National University of Singapore, Kishore served for 33 years as a diplomat for Singapore and has written many articles on world affairs. He served two stints as Singapore's Ambassador to the UN and as President of the UN Security Council in January 2001 and May 2002. In 2005, *Foreign Policy* magazine included him among the top 100 public intellectuals in the world.

JAMES TRAUB (*commentator*) is a contributing writer for *The New York Times Magazine*, where he has worked since 1998. From 1994 to 1997, he was a staff writer for *The New Yorker*. He has also written for *The New York Review of Books*, *Foreign Affairs*, *The Atlantic Monthly*, *The New Republic* and elsewhere. His articles have been widely reprinted and anthologized. He has written extensively about international affairs and especially the United Nations. In recent years, he has reported from the Congo, Iran, Iraq, Sierra Leone, East Timor, Egypt, Angola, Kosovo and Haiti. He is the author of The Best Intentions: Kofi Annan and The UN in The Era of American World Power. His next book, The Freedom Agenda: Why America Must Spread Democracy (Just Not Like George Bush Did), will be published in September. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

YVONNE TERLINGEN (*commentator*) heads Amnesty International's United Nations Office in New York where she has represented the organization since 2001. She has worked for many years at Amnesty International's International Secretariat, focusing on Asia and international organizations. At the United Nations, she served as Head of the Belgrade Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights in the former Yugoslavia and established the UN's first Victims and Witnesses Unit at the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia in The Hague. She studied law at the University of Amsterdam, and criminology, international human rights and United Nations law at the London School of Economics.
